



THE TEN COMMANDMENTS OF GOOD SAFETY HABITS

In most everything we do, we find a "trick" to make the process easier and faster. After we develop these tricks, they become work habits in our everyday activities. Developing everyday safety habits can keep you injury free through the year. Here are ten safety habits to live by:

Set Your Own Standards. Don't be influenced by others around you who are negative. If you fail to wear safety glasses because others don't, remember the blindness you may suffer will be yours alone to live with.

Operate Equipment Only if Qualified. Your supervisor may not realize you have never done the job before. You have the responsibility to let your supervisor know, so the necessary training can be provided.

Respect Machinery. If you put something in a machine's way, it will crush it, pinch it or cut it. Make sure all guards are in place. Never hurry beyond your ability to think and act safely. Remember to deenergize the power first before placing your hands in a point of operation.

Use Your Own Initiative for Safety Protection. You are in the best position to see problems when they arise. Ask for the personal protective equipment or additional guidance you need.

Ask Questions. If you are uncertain, ask. Do not accept answers that contain, "I think, I assume, I guess." Be sure.

Use Care and Caution When Lifting. Most muscle and spinal injuries are from overstrain. Know your limits. Do not attempt to exceed them. The few minutes it takes to get help will prevent weeks of being off work and in pain.

Practice Good Housekeeping. Disorganized work areas are the breeding grounds for accidents. You may not be the only victim. Don't be a cause.

Wear Proper and Sensible Work Clothes. Wear sturdy and appropriate footwear. These should enclose the foot fully. Avoid loose clothing, dangling jewelry, and be sure that long hair is tied back and cannot become entangled in the machinery.

Practice Good Personal Cleanliness. Avoid touching eyes, face, and mouth with gloves or hands that are dirty. Wash well and use barrier creams when necessary. Most industrial rashes are the result of poor hygiene practices.

Be a Positive Part of the Safety Team. Willingly accept and follow safety rules. Encourage others to do so. Your attitude can play a major role in the prevention of accidents and injuries.



WET MARCH WEATHER IMPROVES DROUGHT CONDITIONS STATE WIDE PRECIPITATION FOR MARCH MORE THAN 1.5 INCHES ABOVE NORMAL

The latest weather statistics announced today by the Illinois State Water Survey, a division of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, indicates above average precipitation for the month of March across the state finally helping offset dry conditions for the last 12 months.

"Preliminary data for Illinois indicate that 4.79 inches of precipitation fell in March, 1.57 inches above normal or


149 percent of normal, and is the 16th wettest March since 1895. This offsets the dry February, which was 1.05 inches below normal. As a result of the wet March, precipitation for 2006 is at 8.41 inches, which is 1.34 inches above normal," says State Climatologist Jim Angel of the Illinois State Water Survey.

The statewide March mean temperature of 41.4 degrees was 0.3 degrees above normal. The statewide temperature for 2006 is 36.7 degrees, 4.6 degrees above normal, and the 8th warmest January-March on record since 1895. Temperature extremes ranged from 82 degrees at Belleville on March 31 to 9 degrees at Mt. Carroll on March 4. Grayville reported the heaviest one-day precipitation, 4.25 inches on March 12, as well as the highest monthly total, 10.74 inches.

"Receiving above-normal rainfall in March means that we are making headway against the drought in northern and western Illinois. An additional 1 to 3 inches fell in central and western Illinois in the first 11 days of April. However, subsurface soil moisture, streams, and shallow groundwater remain below normal in places in that region," says Angel. "It may take several months of normal to above-normal precipitation to overcome the impacts of the severe precipitation deficits of 2005."

The Water Survey will continue to monitor the situation and post updates (http://www.sws.uiuc.edu/hilites/drought/). April is usually when the last freezing temperatures occur: Southern Illinois (April 7), Central Illinois (April 14–21), and

Northern Illinois (April 28). If you're planting tender annuals, add about 2 weeks to those dates. See (http://www.sws.uiuc.edu/atmos/statecli/Frost/frost.htm) for more frost information.

GABBING WITH THE GALS...


Well folks, here I am in the hospital for 6 weeks and the third time. Have to receive antibiotic four times a day

Lake Hopatcong Yacht Club

The Lake Hopatcong Yacht Club is a private club located in northwestern New Jersey, on the state's largest lake. The club was founded in 1905, and the current clubhouse dates to 1910. The clubhouse was built in the Adirondack style, using local logs, and was recently placed on the National and New Jersey registers of historic places.

HIGH COST OF CRUDE DRIVES UP PRICES AT THE **PUMP**

The price of crude oil climbed higher into record territory topping \$72 a barrel. The high cost of crude oil, along with seasonal refinery outages, is driving up prices at the gas pump.

The Energy Department's weekly report on petroleum carried a headline Wednesday, asking "\$3 per gallon?" That question has already been answered in Los Angeles and some other parts of the country, where gasoline prices hit the \$3 mark this week.

"The bad news is the numbers are going to keep going up. We expect that gasoline over the next few weeks could go, on average, to \$3.10, \$3.20 a gallon," says spokeswoman Carol Thorpe of the American Automobile Association.

These high prices are coming weeks before the busy, summer-driving season. But it's no longer predictable that gas prices will peak at the same time the thermometer does.

"It used to be sure that every holiday, the gas prices would go up. Every summer the gas prices would go up," Thorpe says. "But what we've seen is gas prices go up at odd times: down on holidays, maybe down in the summer, then up over Labor Day. So it really is dependent on what's happening in the oil markets, what's happening in the world, what's happening to supply."

What's happening in the world right now has pushed oil prices to an all-time high. That's partly a result of tensions with the big oil-producing countries of Iran and Nigeria.

"This market seems to be on a track to continue to move higher, and there doesn't seem to be anything in the near term that's going to stop this momentum," says analyst Phil Flynn of Alaron Trading in Chicago.

With the stock market rallying this week, there's no sign of the kind of economic slowdown that might cut into demand for oil. And drivers are still using more gasoline than they did a year ago, even though it now costs them more than 50 cents a gallon more.


The Energy Department says it's not a foregone conclusion that the average price of gasoline nationwide will hit the \$3 mark this year. The Department expects many refineries that are now shut down for maintenance will soon begin pumping gas again. That should boost supplies and perhaps lower prices just in time for Memorial Day. The Energy Department expects gas prices to remain about 25 cents a gallon higher than they were last year, though. And that's assuming there are no major disruptions in oil or gas supplies.



THINGS TO CONSIDER BEFORE YOU DIG

Knowing what lies below the ground before a shovel or auger touches it can prevent costly and serious accidents. Representatives of JULIE, Inc. (Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators) recently announced the kick-off of a statewide public safety campaign, entitled "See What We See," that stresses the importance of calling the one-call system (1-800-892-0123) before starting any digging projects.

"Careless digging poses a threat to people and underground facilities," said Mark A. Frost, executive director at JULIE, Inc. "Homeowners and contractors can avoid injuries and protect the state's vital energy and telecommunications infrastructure with one phone call before doing any work that requires digging, regardless of the depth or size of the project. The call to JULIE and service provided by members are free."



According to the Common Ground Alliance (CGA), a 1,200 member, national inter-industry group that promotes safety, there are about 400,000 excavation incidents each year across the United States resulting in substantial damage to facilities and about 50 fatalities. Illinois law requires anyone digging to call JULIE, Inc. at least two working days prior to the start of excavation and to begin that project within 14 calendar days from the call. The 48 hour notice does not include Saturdays, Sundays or holidays.

SAFETY TIPS FOR HOMEOWNERS AND CONTRACTORS

Today, more utility companies that supply power, gas, water and telecommunications are delivering these services underground. Following are a few simple safety tips when planning outdoor projects:

- Call JULIE (1-800-892-0123) before you dig;
- Wait the required amount of time (two working days)
- · Respect the marks; and
- · Dig with care.

"Digging safely is never out of season. Call center representatives at JULIE are available to receive and process calls 24 hours a day, seven days a week," Frost continued.

TYPES OF OUTDOOR PROJECTS

For residents considering any improvements and/or repairs outside the home, following a few precautions can help avoid a painful and costly accident. Common examples of homeowner projects that require a call to JULIE before digging include putting up a fence; installing a swing set, a mail box post or water feature such as a pool, pond or fountain; building a deck or room addition; preparing a new garden area; or planting trees, bushes or shrubs.

JULIE, Inc. is a not-for-profit corporation that provides excavators with a toll-free number (1-800-892-0123) for the free locating and marking of underground facilities. JULIE serves as a notification service for underground facility owners, taking information about planned excavations and distributing this information to its membership. It is then the responsibility of each facility owner to mark the location of their underground facilities at the excavation site. JULIE neither owns nor marks any underground facilities.

The Illinois One-Call System received a record 1.225 million underground utility locate requests from professional excavators and homeowners in 2005.

Established in 1974, JULIE represents more than 1,700 members. JULIE has 100 employees during peak periods and is located in a state-of-the-art facility in Joliet, Illinois.

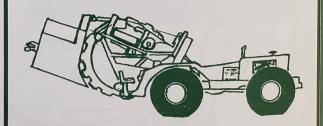
