

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Greetings from Mattoon,

I want to say a big <u>thank you</u> for all our members that volunteered their time this summer to make the summer events go smoothly. Without your help it would not be possible.

Today is October 24 and harvest is almost over. We have hit the fields and have completed a lot of work already since crops came out early and the weather was great. Rain in our area began the last couple of weeks slowing our work a

little, however, it is needed.

I hope everyone else is busy as well as it keeps you out of trouble. Crops were excellent and it appears farmers came out ahead. My only fear is when the farmer has a profitable year the seed, fertilizer, cash rent, & many other supplies costs conveniently raise. However, the early harvest, very warm weather and just enough moisture caused the above conditions. I was told that a loss of 4% of corn during harvest is expected every year.



- Kaskaskia College, Centralia, Thursday, February 7.



They will provide professional, easy to understand instruction on the planning, design and installation of subsurface drainage systems. most knowledgeable authorities in this field. Years at NRCS and his current position at Maurer-Stutz Inc.

Engineering and Surveying firm gives Jim Evans the

expertise to instruct both landowners and contractors in drainage design and installation. This "Basics & Benefits of Sub-Surface Drainage" workshop is open to the public. LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

HR2421 "CLEAN WATER RESTORATION ACT OF 2007

The following is of great concern. AGC is opposed, Farm Bureau is opposed, as are many others.

Congress is considering the "Clean Water Restoration Act of 2007," HR2421. This bill would delete the term "navigable" from the Clean Water Act and replace it with "Waters of the United States." This action would have far reaching effect, taking jurisdiction over all intrastate waters away from the states and giving it to the Corps of Engineers and EPA. That includes ground water, ditches, pipes, streets, municipal storm drains,

gutters, ponds, etc. The Corps and EPA would have authority over all "activities affecting these waters," public or private. This could mean grading and shaping, site preparation, tiling, clearing, you name it if it affects the waters.

If you think today's rules are a nightmare, just wait! Every contractor must contact his/her Congressman and implore them to defeat this bill. Their livelihood depends on it!

Send this message on your company's letterhead to your Congressman:

Dear Congressman_

It has come to my attention that Congress is considering the "Clean Water Restoration Act of 2007" (HR2421) that will delete the term "navigable" from the Clean Water Act and replace it with "Waters of the United States." This would infringe on State's Rights in that intrastate waters will then come under Federal jurisdiction. The result will greatly hinder land improvement work on farms and ranches and perhaps stop even maintenance of water management systems all together. I urge you to vote against this bill and to encourage your fellow Congressmen to do so, also. Sincerely,

Call your Congressman's office and say the following:

If this bill passes, it will do irreparable harm to the progress of conservation work involving water management throughout the country. I am asking you to vote against this bill, and to urge your fellow Congressmen to do the same.



HOTEL ROOMS RESERVED IOWA FARM PROGRESS SHOW AUGUST 26, 27, 28, 2008





plan and coordinating potential cost share funding from other conservation agencies. We should have the plan in time to review with ILICA members at the 2008 ILICA convention in January. This early in the fiscal year is a very good time to apply for cost



share funding and things should be in order well in advance of the show. Cindy Laegeler is excited about our return and will continue to coordinate closely with ILICA Executive Director, Janet Doubet, as the process continues. Tentative dates of August 19 - 21, 2008, putting the conservation expo a week prior to the Iowa Farm Progress Show. Current practices included in the conservation plan are: field borders, waterway diversion, drainage tile, planted windbreak, and 2 enhanced wetland restorations. Keep checking the newsletters and website for updated information as planning continues over the coming year.





USDA ANNOUNCES MORE THAN \$11 MILLION IN

WATER QUALITY GRANTS

WASHINGTON, Oct 10, 2007 – Acting Agriculture Secretary Chuck Conner announced today that more than \$11 million in grants will be awarded to universities nationwide to address water supply and water quality issues in rural, agricultural and urbanizing watersheds. Highlighted among these grants are two projects that address bioenergy production and water resource issues.

"As we move forward in developing our capacity to produce biofuels, we must understand the impacts on our natural resources," Conner said.
"These studies will help government, industry and farmers and ranchers make the most environmentally sound and sustainable choices to produce bioenergy."

The two projects, funded by the USDA's Cooperative State Research, Education, and Extension Service (CSREES), take unique approaches to addressing bioenergy development.



Investigators at Washington State University will explore the impacts of irrigating switchgrass for bioenergy development. The project will test long-lived, water-efficient perennial grasses for biofuel production to supplement the nation's energy supply, saving water for human, food and other societal needs.

At the University of Wisconsin, investigators are attempting to address the environmental and economic impacts of an emerging bio-economy in 14 Midwest states. Their efforts focus on how best to provide a research-based understanding of the issues and provide a robust outreach program that engages communities and key stakeholder interests in appropriate decision making that respects local economies and the environment.

CSREES funded these grants through its National Integrated Water Quality Program (NIWQP). The NIWQP program includes regional and national water quality coordination projects, along with watershed-scale projects to support combined agricultural research, extension and education activities. Funded projects lead to science-based decision making and management practices that improve the quality of the nation's surface water and groundwater resources in agricultural, rural and urbanizing watersheds.

SENATE RELEASES FARM BILL PROPOSAL

October 23, 2007 NACD Notes:

Today, Senate Agriculture Committee Chairman Tom Harkin (D-IA) officially released the bi-partisan legislative proposal for the 2007 Farm Bill. Ranking Member Saxby Chambliss (R-GA) and Senator Kent Conrad (D-ND) support the proposal after weeks of negotiations on the provisions. The Committee is scheduled to work on the legislative text tomorrow morning in a "mark-up" that allows Senators on the committee to amend or alter the proposal. The Conser-

vation Title continues all current conservation programs and revises the Conservation Security Program into the Comprehensive Stewardship Program. Overall the proposal provides close to \$4.5 billion in additional spending for conservation programs. Details of the Conservation section are below and the complete farm bill can be found at http://agriculture.senate.gov/.

2007 Farm Bill Conservation Title - Investing in the Future Health of America's Agricultural Lands

- Expands the Comprehensive Stewardship Program to enroll over 13.2 million acres nationwide every year through 2012 and includes eligibility criteria based on local input to best address local environmental priorities and concerns. Establishes a funding level of \$1.28 billion above existing baseline over 10years, and will allow enrollment of an additional 80 million acres over the next 5 years
- Creates the Comprehensive Stewardship Incentives Program, which will better coordinate the main working lands programs: CSP and EQIP. This umbrella program will require the Secretary to coordinate the programs and utilize a consistent process to identify resource needs.
- The Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) is funded at baseline levels through 2012. Forest management, pollinator habitat and organics are added as eligible activities. New incentives are available to foster conservation planning. Allows socially disadvantaged and beginning farmers and ranchers to receive 30 percent of their payment in advance for purchases of materials and labor. Includes \$165 million to address natural resource concerns in the Chesapeake Bay watershed
- Maintains the Conservation Reserve Program at 39.2 million acres. Adds pollinator habitat as a purpose of the program. Provides a priority for local ownership in accepting contract offers
- The Farmland Protection Program is reauthorized at baseline levels. The program purpose emphasizes limiting nonagricultural uses of the land
- Reauthorizes the Wetlands Reserve Program and provides funds to enroll 250,000 acres per year through 2012. Also provides new funding for the Grassland Reserve Program
- Continues the Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program and adds incentive payments. Gives priority to projects that would further the goals and objectives of State, regional, and national fish and wildlife conservation plans
- Sets aside 10% of conservation funds for beginning and socially disadvantaged farmers. After a certain date, any unused funds would be returned to the donor program to fund other applications
- Adds a new grant program to encourage states and tribes to allow public access on private lands for wildlife-related recreation such as hunting, fishing, and bird watching
- Directs the Secretary to create a framework to facilitate the participation of farmers in greenhouse gas reduction and other environmental services markets.
 The framework will use a collaborative process to establish uniform standards, accounting procedures, reporting protocols and verification processes
- The partnership and cooperation provisions from 2002 farm bill are clarified and improved. Incorporates most of the Regional Water Enhancement Program

The Conservation Title will assist farmers and ranchers in providing clean water, clean air and wildlife habitat while producing food, feed, fiber and fuel.

- Improving the nation's soil resource: Working land programs help producers protect and improve the quality of their soil resources and support agricultural productivity and environmental quality. Building the quality of the soil through conservation measures helps to prevent erosion, benefiting land productivity as well as water and air quality. Easement programs are a complement, providing for retirement of the Nation's most highly vulnerable acres, and ensuring that working farms and ranches remain in production.
- Water conservation: Conservation on working lands helps keep soil and nutrients where they are needed, benefiting crops and water quality. Other conservation measures buffer streams and rivers - capturing soil and nutrients or limiting livestock access. In-field measures improve soil moisture and reduce supplemental water needs, while irrigation water management can make the most of scarce water resources.
 - Wildlife and agriculture work together: Agricultural and forest lands
 provide a wealth of wildlife habitat and
 conservation programs help improve
 the quality and connectivity of that habitat. Working land programs can maintain residue providing cover and food,
 while buffers that shield fields or shelter
 livestock can be managed for native
 pollinators. Easements and buffers provide corridors that benefit species
 movement and protect aquatic habitat
 while protecting agriculture from the
 pressures of development.

Prepare a Winter Storm Plan

- •Have extra blankets on hand.
- •Ensure that each member of your household has a warm coat, gloves or mittens, hat, and water-resistant boots.

Assemble a Disaster Supplies Kit Containing

- First aid kit and essential medications.
- •Battery-powered NOAA Weather radio, flashlight, and extra batteries.
- •Canned food and can opener.
- •Bottled water (at least one gallon of water per person per day to last at least 3 days).
- •Extra warm clothing, including boots, mittens, and a hat.
- Assemble a Disaster Supplies Kit for your car, too.
- Have your car winterized before winter storm season.

Stay Tuned for Storm Warnings...

•Listen to NOAA Weather Radio and your local radio and TV stations for updated storm information.

Know What Winter Storm WATCHES and WARNINGS Mean

- •A winter storm WATCH means a winter storm is possible in your area.
- •A winter storm WARNING means a winter storm is headed for your area.
- A blizzard WARNING means strong winds, blinding winddriven snow, and dangerous wind chill are expected. Seek shelter immediately!

When a Winter Storm WATCH is Issued...

- •Listen to NOAA Weather Radio, local radio, and TV stations, or cable TV such as The Weather Channel for further updates.
- •Be alert to changing weather conditions.
- Avoid unnecessary travel.

When a Winter Storm WARNING is Issued...

- •Stay indoors during the storm.
- •If you must go outside, several layers of lightweight clothing will keep you warmer than a single heavy coat. Gloves (or mittens) and a hat will prevent loss of body heat. Cover your mouth to protect your lungs.
- •Understand the hazards of wind chill, which combines the cooling effect of wind and cold temperatures on exposed skin.
- •As the wind increases, heat is carried away from a person's body at an accelerated rated, driving down the body tempera-
- After the storm, if you shovel snow, be extremely careful. It is physically strenuous work, so take frequent breaks. Avoid over-exertion.

When a Winter Storm WARNING is Issued... (cont)

- •Walk carefully on snowy, icy, sidewalks.
- •Avoid traveling by car in a storm, but if you must.... carry a Disaster Supplies Kit in the trunk.
- •Keep your car's gas tank full for emergency use and to keep the fuel line from freezing.
- •Let someone know your destination, your route, and when you expect to arrive. If your car gets stuck along the way, help can be sent along your predetermined route.



If You Do Get Stuck...

- •Stay with your car. Do not try to walk to safety.
- Tie a brightly colored cloth (preferably red) to the antenna for rescuers to see.
- •Start the car and use the heater for about

10 minutes every hour. Keep the exhaust pipe clear so fumes won't back up in the car.

- •Leave the overhead light on when the engine is running so that you can be seen.
- •As you sit, keep moving your arms and legs to keep blood circulating and to stay warm.
- •Keep one window away from the blowing wind slightly open to let in air.

What to Do After a Winter Storm


•Continue listening to local radio or television stations or a NOAA Weather Radio for updated information and instructions. Access may be limited to some parts of the community, or roads may be blocked.



- •Help a neighbor who may require special assistance—infants, elderly people, and people with disabilities. Elderly people and people with disabilities may require additional assistance. People who care for them or who have large families may need additional assistance in emergency situations.
- •Avoid driving and other travel until conditions have improved. Roads may be blocked by snow or emergency vehicles.
- Avoid overexertion. Heart attacks from shoveling heavy snow are a leading cause of deaths during winter. Follow forecasts and be prepared when venturing outside. Major winter storms are often followed by even colder conditions.









GEOTHERMAL CAN CUT POWER BILLS IN HALF


There is an age-old but little used source of alternative energy available to just about everyone, just about everywhere. It can save you as much as 50 percent on your heating and cooling bills—and it's right beneath your feet.

Six to eight feet below the earth's surface, the ground remains at a relatively constant temperature. The stable, even heat of the earth can be used as a heat source in the winter and a heat sink in the summer to provide residential and commercial buildings with heating and air conditioning, using a geothermal heat pump.

"The geothermal heat pump (GHP) is one of the most efficient and environmentally friendly heating and cooling systems available today," said Xinlei Wang, a professor in the Department of Agricultural and Biological Engineering at the University of Illinois. A normal heat pump system extracts heat from outdoor air and transfers it inside, where it is circulated through your home's ductwork by a fan, said Wang.



"If you want to keep it 70 degrees inside and it's below zero outside, a heat pump would have to work pretty hard to produce those temperatures," Wang explained. "But if we use underground heat as our source, even on the coldest day, the temperature is still 45 to 50 degrees six to eight feet below ground. Going from 50 to 70 degrees, your efficiency will be much higher."



A GHP works by collecting the earth's natural heat through a series of pipes (called a loop) that are installed below the surface of the ground. These loops can also be submersed in a pond or lake. Fluid in the loop, either water or an environmentally safe antifreeze solution, circulates through the pipes in a closed system and carries the heat to the house. An electrically driven compressor and a heat exchanger concentrate the energy and, using typical ductwork, release it inside the home at a higher temperature. In the summer, the loop draws excess heat from your home and transfers it back into the ground. The system works the same way your refrigerator keeps your food cool–by drawing heat from the interior, not by blowing in cold air.

There are several loop configurations that can be used, said Wang, but one of the most common is the horizontal ground loop. "Horizontal ground loops are used where there's sufficient land available and where trenches are easy to dig," said Wang. Workers dig trenches 4 to 6 feet deep, 2 feet wide, and then lay a series of parallel plastic pipes. A typical horizontal loop will be 400 to 600 feet long for each ton of heating and cooling, and an average residence requires a 3- to 4-ton unit.


If you have little yard space or you don't want to disrupt the landscape, a vertical ground loop can be used, said Wang. Vertical holes, about 4 inches in diameter, are bored in the ground 150 to

450 feet deep. A single loop of pipe with a U-bend at the bottom is inserted before the hole is backfilled. The vertical pipe is then connected to a horizontal underground pipe that carries fluid to and from the indoor exchange

unit.

A third alternative is the pond loop system. If your property has a pond or lake with an adequate supply of water, a supply line pipe can be run underground from your residence to the water and is coiled into circles at least 8 feet under the surface to prevent freezing. The water source must meet minimum volume, depth and quality criteria.

Because of the technical knowledge and equipment needed to properly install a GHP system, Wang advises finding a qualified installer to do the job. Your local utility company or the Geothermal Heat Pump Consortium should have a listing of qualified installers in your area.




GEOTHERMAL CAN CUT POWER BILLS IN HALF (CONT.)

On average, a geothermal heat pump system costs about \$2,500 per ton of capacity, although a horizontal ground loop system will On average, we generally cost less than a system with vertical loops. And though more conventional heat pump systems cost about half that amount to install, Wang said the savings over time more than make up for the GHP's installation


"Heating efficiencies are 50 to 70 percent higher than other heating systems and cooling efficiencies are 20 to 40 percent higher than available air conditioners," Wang said. "Most of the components are sheltered from the harsh weather, and the underground piping is guaranteed to last anywhere from 25 to 50 years, so there's very little maintenance. These systems generally pay for themselves in five to eight years."

Many people worry about the reliability or durability of some alternative energy technology, said Wang, because it's not mature yet.

"But this is one technology that is very mature," Wang concluded. "People can use it."



HELPFUL TIPS FROM U OF I EXTENSION CONTROL DUST, DUST MITES, AND OTHER ALLERGENS



A growing body of scientific evidence, as well as patients' personal experiences, shows a strong link between indoor dust and illness, especially asthma and allergies. The most common culprits in household dust are dust mites, mold, mildew, fungi, algae, roaches and other insects, pollen, and animal dander.

Droppings from dust mites and cockroaches, as well as their body parts, contain Electrostatic Precipitator powerful allergens. Fine particles of these materials can become airborne as

However, an electrostatic precipitator, which offers high efficiency in removing small particles, can be installed in the return air duct near the home's furnace. The charging section gives particles a positive charge. Then the negatively charged collector holds on to the particles. Units have a remov-

able dust-collecting plate that needs to be cleaned regularly. Pleated filters are much more efficient than standard fibrous furnace filters; smaller ones do not require

modification to the furnace or ductwork. But they are less efficient than electrostatic cleaners. Pleated filters should be inspected regularly and may need more frequent replacement than conventional filters.

Passive electrostatic filters are naturally charged by static electricity (they use no power) and fit into a standard filter slot. They provide fairly good filtration, but not as good as some pleated filters. Although somewhat expensive, these filters can be washed and reused.



Room-sized air cleaners, which are usually placed in sleeping rooms or where occupants spend most of Passive Electrostatic Filter their time, must be coupled with other dust-control strategies. The most effective room-sized units are either the electrostatic precipitator or HEPA type. A HEPA filter is a high-efficiency particulate-arresting

filter, capable of removing most of the particles that can cause health concerns. If you use a vacuum cleaner for dust control, ideally it should have a HEPA filter. Mites grow best at 75- to 80-percent relative humidity. In warm weather, air-conditioning can be used to maintain a humidity level of 50 percent or lower. You can use a humidity gauge to determine the level of humidity in the bedroom. During winter, try to keep indoor humidity levels in the range of 35 to 50 percent—the optimum range for health.

Mold, mildew, fungi, and algae require high moisture levels, wet surfaces, or standing water to grow. Make sure drip trays under refrigerate to the house repair water refrigerators and air conditioners are properly drained or regularly emptied. Eliminate standing water in the house, repair water damage, and kill visible growths on walls or other surfaces.
