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





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# GOV. BLAGOJEVICH ANNOUNCES STATE FAIR GRANDSTAND LINEUP

Entertainment features Country Music Association Award winners Rascal Flatts and Brad Paisley

SPRINGFIELD – Governor Rod Blagojevich today announced the Grandstand lineup for the 2005 Illinois State Fair. Among the bands taking the stage Aug. 12–21 are two of the hottest county music acts on the circuit, CMA Award winners Brad Paisley and Rascal Flatts along with the vicious sound of Velvet Revolver, who placed #1 in two sections of the Rolling Stone Readers' Poll for Best New Artist and Best Hard Rock/Metal Band in an early 2005 issue.

"The State Fair staff has done an excellent job putting together a Grandstand lineup that appeals to a broad range of music fans, from country to classic, southern and modern rock," Gov. Blagojevich said. "The 2005 State Fair Grandstand lineup will not only showcase great bands but the prices are also affordable keeping with our tradition to maintain a family friendly event."

- Friday, August 12th The Illinois State Fair kicks off with 2005 County Music Association Award winners Rascal Flatts taking the stage. The group took home the 2005 CMA award for Best Group Video of the Year for "Feels Like Today." All together, their first three albums have sold more than 6 million copies and their recent hit single "Bless the Broken Road" sat at #1 for 5 consecutive weeks. Opening the evening for Rascal Flatts is county music star Blake Shelton. Tickets are \$17.50, \$22.50 and \$27.50 for reserved grandstand seats and \$27.50 for the track area in front of the stage.
- Saturday, August 13th: Southern rockers Lynyrd Skynyrd will perform over thirty years of hits. The band recently collected their 18th gold and 12th platinum award for Thyrty, their double-disc anniversary hits collection. They're best known for songs including "Sweet Home Alabama" and "Free Bird." Alternative Country up-and-comers, Cross Canadian Ragweed will open the show. Tickets are \$18.00.
- Sunday, August 14th: Classic Rock group REO Speedwagon returns to the grandstand. Their performance at the 2000 Illinois State Fair with Styx sold over 11,000 tickets. They will be joined at the 2005 State Fair by Cheap Trick and Head East. Tickets are \$18.00.
- Monday, August 15th and Tuesday, August 16th: Visitors will enjoy evening harness racing at the fair. Tentative post-time is 4:30 p.m. Admission is free.
- Wednesday, August 17th: The Illinois State Fair presents Velvet Revolver: Scott Weiland (lead vocals), Slash (guitar), Duff McKagan (bass), Matt Sorum (drums), and Dave Kushner (guitar) - - are touring arenas in connection with their platinum-plus debut Contraband album, featuring the Grammy Award-winning and #1 rock single "Slither," as well as the band's other #1 rock hit "Fall To Pieces," plus their blazing new single "Dirty Little Thing." 'Contraband' debuted at #1 on the Billboard album chart, selling over 250,000 copies. Newsweek describes the band as "truly explosive" and Maxim says, "Slash and Scott Weiland bring unpredictability back to rock." Tickets are \$30.00, \$25.00 and \$20.00 for reserved grandstand seats and \$30.00 for the track area in front of the stage.
- Friday, August 19th: Award winning country music artist Brad Paisley will perform on the Grandstand stage. Paisley walked away from the 2005 CMA Awards with Best Collaborative Video of the Year for "Whisky Lullaby," with Alison Krauss. His most recent album "Mud on the Tires" has reach double platinum status and the title track song is Paisley's fourth #1 hit. County music trio SheDaisy will open the show. Tickets are \$22.50, \$17.50 and \$15.00 for reserved grandstand seats and \$22.50 for the track area in front of the stage.
- Saturday, August 20th: Simple Plan will take the stage. Their recently released album "Still Not Getting Any..." has sold millions of copies and features hit songs including "Shut Up!" "Me Against the World" and "Untitled (How Could This Happen to Me?)." The group has shared the stage with everyone from Rancid to Aerosmith; made appearances on the Vans Warped Tour for three years running (two as Headliners), and have been nominated for four MTV Video Music Awards. Jesse McCartney will open the show. Tickets are \$27.50, \$22.50 and \$17.50 for reserved grandstand seats and \$27.50 for the track area in front on the stage.
- Sunday, August 21nd: The grandstand entertainment concludes with a free concert by the Illinois Symphony Orchestra at 7:30 p.m.

Presale tickets will be available through Ticket Master by phone and internet starting April 30th and sales open at all Ticket Master locations May 14th. Hopefully this will conclude the whole project. Of course there will be therapy afterward with which I am well acquainted but has to be done to get the leg to full use. Staying in the hospital for six weeks is the most time I have been away from my home and has caused this old lady to become homesick. At least at home I will be where Clyde has been for all these years and it seems closer to him plus I must be a "homebody" at heart. Anyway it will be wonderful to be in my own place after June 18. If you can, prayers will be appreciated.

The group who went to Tinsel Town for the LICA convention no doubt enjoyed it. The weather was very good too I understand. No one from Day Drainage could go this year — too busy as well as other commitments. We miss not seeing the old friends we have made and of course meeting new ones. The ladies' meeting is always interesting and the silent auction is fun. Hopefully someone from our company can attend the picnic meeting — that is the day my hospital stay ends so I believe I will take a rain check. Hope to be able to attend one or two board meetings this fall.

Condolences to the Kathryn Royer and her family on the death of C.B. He and Kathryn are great supporters of ILICA and we enjoyed their company. There are several we already miss if we'd gone to the LICA convention. They say that's the way the world turns, but it's still devastating when it happens. We will have a wedding August 13 in our family — Dan's second eldest Sarah will be married that day. Her fiancé is a very good person and well — liked — they will live in Paxton which is just 15 miles east of Gibson City. Dan's son Nick lives in Lawrence Kansas pursuing what he went to college for. We have two grandsons who are taking Drivers Ed and that is always interesting. One will be driving in the busy traffic of Chicago suburbs, so don't envy him. Actually, just driving on an interstate is scary, as there are some crazies out there — but that is another topic.

The word for this issue is faith — the more the world experiences troubles the more we need our faith. Sometimes we wonder how long God will put up with us. 

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## HOW DRY WAS SPRING 2005? WEDNESDAY, JUNE 01, 2005

How dry was Spring 2005 (March-May) across Illinois? Here are some weather facts from the National Weather Service:

- Peoria had its second driest May on record - 0.69 inches of rain. The driest May on record was in 1934. It was the city's third driest Spring with 4.16 inches of rain.
- St. Louis reported its third driest Spring on record with 4.42 inches of rain.
- Springfield reported its sixth driest Spring on record with 5.29 inches of rain
- Chicago reported its seventh driest Spring on record with 5.00 inches of rain
- Moline had 4.9 inches of rain during Spring 2005. The driest spring on record in the Quad Cities was 3.09 inches in 1934.



Well, it came down to the wire... the 93rd Illinois General Assembly adjourned Tuesday, May 31, 2005 with the Democrats agreeing on a budget avoiding a consecutive overtime session. The \$57.9 billion budget (\$24.4 billion General Revenue Fund) was approved along partisan lines. The budget includes appropriations for operating expenses, grant programs, re-appropriations and necessary services. No new capital appropriations were included. Below is a brief summary of how each program was changed from FY 05.


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# CONSERVATION EXPO 2005, AUGUST 9 – 11

Conservation Expo 2005 is coming to western Illinois on August 9, 10, & 11, 2005. This statewide event is a showcase for the construction and exhibition of conservation and land improvement practices and equipment. This year's Conservation Expo will take place on the Jerry & Leslie Lewis Farm, Good Hope, IL.

The Illinois Land Improvement Contractors Association is one of over 20 local, state, and federal agencies or groups which are co-sponsoring the Conservation Expo 2005 in cooperation with the Illinois Land Improvement Contractors Association (ILICA). The Conservation Expo 2005 Show Site is located southeast of Good Hope, IL, in McDonough County, in western Illinois. From the intersection of IL Rt. 9 and US 67 on the south edge of Good Hope, go one-half mile south on US 67 and then 2 miles east on County Rd 1800 N. (follow the signs). Good Hope, IL is located 26 miles south of Monmouth, 33 miles north of Rushville, 6 miles north of Macomb, and 9 miles west of Bushnell.

Throughout the 3-day event, tours will be conducted to showcase the following conservation structures and practices: Tile Drainage/Drainage Water Management, Wildlife Food Plots, Filter Strips, Streambank Stabilization Control – Rock Riffles & Stone Toe Protection, Landscape and Habitat Management, Block Chute Construction, Grassed Waterways, Sealing Abandoned Wells, Wetland Development, Pond Management, Agro-Forestry Planting & Mgmt., Dry Hydrant Installation, Water and Sediment Control Basins (Dry Dams), A Soils Demonstration and New Septic System Installations. Tour guides will be at each of the sites throughout the show to discuss installation techniques, cost of construction, and benefits to the landowner and the watershed.

Certified Crop Advisers may also receive Continuing Education Credits for attending the 2005 Illinois Conservation Expo. Tours A and B have each been assigned 2 hours of continuing education credit in Soil & Water Mgmt. Sign up sheets for credit will be in Headquarters Tent. There will also be Featured Speakers, located at the Headquarters Tent, who will discuss current Natural Resources topics and issues impacting landowners and farmers.



The hours of the Conservation Expo are Tuesday & Thursday: 9 a.m. – 4 p.m.; and Wednesday 9 a.m. – 7 p.m. There is no admission charge, and everyone is welcome to attend, including landowners, farmers, agri-businesses, conservationists, planners and the general public. Food and drink concessions will be available at the show site.

# SPRINGFIELD PLASTICS, INC. RECEIVES CERTIFICATION FOR PIPE


## ONLY COMPANY IN U.S. TO USE 100% VIRGIN RESIN

Springfield Plastics, Inc. is currently the only corrugated pipe producer in the United States to have its use of virgin resin certified. Stephen Baker, President of the company stated, "We feel it is very important to our customers to know that we want to make this commitment to them year after year. That's why we have continued to receive this certification, to be a leader in providing top quality drainage products"

This is the 5th year in a row that SPI has received certification that the company only purchases virgin resin to be used in the manufacture of its drainage pipe. Standard setting organizations, such as ASTM and USDA-NRCS, have required the use of virgin resin materials for many years. The Plastic Pipe Institute (PPI) has also released a position-statement stating that recycled materials should not be used in piping materials. However, many drainage pipe companies continue to use recycled materials in their product to reduce their costs. According to Plastic News recycled materials can cost five to seven cents per pound less than virgin materials. Over the years, the use of recycled materials in plastic products has been promoted as a way of enhancing plastics recycling efforts. Baker notes, "We are environmentally sensitive to the recycling issues we have today, but we believe using the recycled materials affects the structure and durability of the pipe. The industry standards require the use of raw material. It is critical we follow these standards in order to lead the way in providing the highest quality product possible to the agricultural producer."

ASTM and PPI have always been concerned with the wide variability of the physical properties in recycled material and how these properties would affect the long-term performance of drainage pipe. The variability in the materials could lead to stress cracking, poor crush and impact strengths and uneven wall thickness. Baker adds, "None of these properties are desirable in our drainage pipe. It's our

company's philosophy that quality must be a priority; therefore the standards set must be followed. Farmers expect the drainage pipe they install in their farm fields to serve them for many years and be top quality. We feel that being the only company to extend our certification of virgin resin use to our customers is meeting that goal"




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# HOME AND GARDEN TIPS

## Lawn and Garden Care

### Rules of Thumb for Water Use on Lawns and Gardens

- One deep watering is much better than watering several times lightly.
- Lawns need about 1 inch of water each week. If the weather is very hot, apply an inch of water about every 3 days.
- Watering to a depth of 4-6 inches encourages deeper, healthier root development. It allows longer periods between watering.
- To measure the water, put an empty tuna can (or cat food can) on the lawn while watering. Stop watering when the can is full or if you notice water running off the lawn.

## Know Your Soil

Different soil types have different watering needs. You don't need to be a soil scientist to know how to water your soil properly. These tips can help.

- Loosen the soil around plants so it can quickly absorb water and nutrients.
- Use a 1- to 2-inch protective layer of mulch on the soil surface above the root area. Cultivating and mulching reduce evaporation and soil erosion.
- Clay soil: Add organic material such as compost or peat moss. Till or spade to help loosen the soil. Since clay soil absorbs water very slowly, water only as fast as the soil absorbs the water.
- Sandy soil: Add organic material to supplement sandy soil. Otherwise, the water can run through it so quickly that plants won't be able to absorb it.
- Loam soil: The best kind of soil. It's a combination of sand, silt, and clay. Loam absorbs water readily and stores it for plants to use.

## Water at the Right Time of the Day

- Early morning or night is the best time for watering to reduce evaporation.
- To help control where your water goes, water when it's not windy.

## Rules of Thumb for Proper Fertilizer Use

Fertilizers provide nutrients necessary for plant health and growth, such as nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium. These are what N, P, and K stand for on bags of fertilizer. Nitrogen (N) is needed for healthy green growth and regulation of other nutrients. Phosphorus (P) helps proper roots and seeds develop and resist disease. Potassium (K) is also important in root development and disease resistance. When properly applied, the nutrients in fertilizers are absorbed by plants and little of these nutrients enters ground or surface water resources.

## Use the Right Fertilizer

- Test your soil to find out what nutrients are needed. Contact your local Natural Resources Conservation Service or Cooperative State Research, Education, and Extension Service office to get information on obtaining a soil test. Local fertilizer dealers can also be helpful.
- A soil test will help you understand what your plants require.
- Follow label directions.
- Choose a fertilizer that has at least one-fourth of the nitrogen in a slow-release form, such as sulphur-coated urea.

## Mow Your Lawn Frequently

Leave the grass clippings to decompose on the lawn. Annually, this will provide nutrients equivalent to one or two fertilizer applications. Set mower at 2 inches to reduce water use during hot weather.

## Apply Fertilizer Properly

- It is best to apply fertilizer when the soil is moist and then water lightly. This will help the fertilizer move into the root zone where it is available to the plants, rather than stay on top of the soil where it can be blown or washed away.
- Watch the weather. Avoid applying it immediately before a heavy rain system is predicted to arrive. Too much rain (or sprinkler water) will take the nutrients away from the lawn's root zone.
- Use the minimal amount of fertilizer necessary and apply it in small, frequent applications. An application of 2 pounds of fertilizer five times per year is better than 5 pounds of fertilizer twice a year.
- Calibrate your fertilizer spreader to be sure you know exactly how much material is being discharged in a given space. Follow instructions accompanying your spreader.
- When spreading fertilizer, cover ends of the lawn first, then go back and forth across the rest of the lawn, using half of the recommended amount. Shut the spreader off before reaching the ends to avoid over-application. Apply the other half of the fertilizer going back and forth perpendicular to the first pattern.
- Dispose of fertilizer bags or containers in a safe and state-approved manner.

## Alternatives to Pesticides and Chemicals

When used incorrectly, pesticides can pollute water. They also kill beneficial as well as harmful insects. Natural alternatives prevent both of these events from occurring and save you money. Consider using natural alternatives for chemical pesticides: Non-detergent insecticidal soaps, garlic, hot pepper sprays, 1 teaspoon of liquid soap in a gallon of water, used dishwater, or forceful stream of water to dislodge insects.

Also consider using plants that naturally repel insects. These plants have their own chemical defense systems, and when planted among flowers and vegetables, they help keep unwanted insects away. The table below contains a partial list of nature's alternatives.

This new system also ensures that the operator's station is less cluttered because the onboard PC is integrated into the existing machine monitor. 

### **Lighting Needs of Houseplants**

Find out if your plants are receiving enough, or too much, sunlight.

### **The Basics**

Light is vital to plants, yet each type of plant, and sometimes individual plants within a type, demand different amounts of it. Each home, too, presents entirely different conditions. That's why you should plan on experimenting with each plant until you find the spot that yields best performance.

There are some general rules, but these all have exceptions. For the most part, flowering plants need more light than foliage plants. Yet croton, a foliage plant, needs lots of light to keep its vibrant leaf color. Most plants with thick, fleshy leaves need little light, yet cacti and succulents thrive in bright light.

Some plants flower according to how long light is present each day, rather than how intense it is. Christmas cactus, chrysanthemum, kalanchoe, and poinsettia are examples of plants that need short days (long nights) to flower properly.

Fortunately, if other conditions — water, soil, and humidity — are right, many plants can live under less-than-perfect light.

### **Different Light**

#### **Natural Light**

To determine the intensity of the light on a given spot in your home, place an object there and check the shadow. The more intense the light, the more defined the shadow. Generally, a south exposure is the brightest. East and west windows can be bright, but usually not as bright as south windows. North windows generally are the dimmest.

Light varies considerably by time of year. Light also varies by what's nearby. It can reflect off light-colored buildings or snow, or be blocked by trees, shades, and awnings.

Light intensity drops dramatically as you move from the source. Plants near a window receive far more light than ones several feet away, even though the room may be flooded with light.

High light is found in a greenhouse or by a window with a southern or southwestern exposure. This is intense light, as strong as can be found indoors. It is also called full sun. Medium light refers to direct exposure from an east or west window. Also receiving medium (or what's often called bright indirect) light are spots near a filtered southern or southwestern exposure (or some distance from a similar exposure that's unfiltered). Low light is found near north windows. The light several feet from an east or west window or far from a southern or southwestern exposure

(in both cases, often called indirect light) also qualifies as low light. Low light is common in corners and bathrooms. It is not total darkness.

Your plants will let you know when the light is not right. Insufficient light causes spindly stems, yellow foliage, and leaf drop. Too much light causes leaf burn or pale foliage.

### **Artificial Light**

Many houseplants thrive in artificial light. The most effective and inexpensive light source for houseplants is a fluorescent tube.

Carefully position plants under the light source (as close as 6 inches, never more than 15 inches away). Keep lights on for as many as 16 hours a day, depending on the plant.

Again, your plants will tell you how much light they need. Flowering plants fail to bud or bloom in poor artificial light. Foliage plants needing more light get tall and spindly. Foliage plants exposed to too much light look ghostly or faded.

To increase the light intensity, use more powerful lights, use more tubes, place the tubes closer together, use white reflectors, move plants closer to tubes, or burn lights longer. Match the length of exposure to the needs of the plant.

When growing plants under fluorescent tubes, rotate the plants regularly since the light at the end of the tubes is often weaker than in the middle. Experiment with lights from different makers and a combination of fluorescent and incandescent bulbs for a broader color spectrum. But be wary of heat generated by incandescent bulbs; it can burn plants if they are placed too close.

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
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
