FEBRUARY ABOVE AVERAGE PRECIPITATION DOESN'T EQUAL ABOVE AVERAGE WATER LEVELS LATEST DROUGHT UPDATE FOR ILLINOIS AVAILABLE

All water resources in Illinois are below their pre-March 2005 levels despite above average precipitation in January 2006 that brought levels closest to normal since the drought onset last year according to the latest report to the Drought Response Task Force. The report states a possible repeat of drought conditions this spring likely would deplete water resources even more quickly than in 2005.

Governor Blagojevich activated the Task Force in 2005—the ninth time since 1984 when the Water Plan Task Force established the protocol for doing so. Since activation last year, members from the Illinois State Water Survey (ISWS) and other agencies have been meetingquite often during the height of the drought, less frequently now-and monitoring issues with potential impacts on public safety and Illinois' economy: agricultural considerations, community water supplies, and private wells.

Report authors from the **ISWS** (http://www.sws.uiuc.edu/) include Chief Derek Winstanley, State Climatologist Jim Angel, and scientists Mike Palecki, Vern Knapp, Amy Russell, Al Wehrmann, Ken Hlinka, and Bob Scott. Task Force members from other agencies include experts from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Water Resource Management, the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency, the Illinois Department of Agriculture, the Illinois Department of Public Health, the Illinois Emergency Management Agency, the Illinois Commerce Commission, and the U.S. Geological Society.

"Statewide precipitation in 4 of the 7 months since July 2005, including January 2006, has been above normal. It


would be easy to conclude that the drought is over. Yet evidence of severe precipitation deficits in much of northern and central Illinois in March–June 2005 remained in January 2006 as low streamflows, depleted soil moisture, and low groundwater and reservoir levels." said ISWS Chief Derek Winstanley.

Winter snow and ice cover typically store water for release in the spring as temperatures warm. "This year there is no snow and ice cover; hence, no water to release. Climate conditions this spring will be critical for water availability and supplies," said Winstanley.

Five key indicators point to the probability, albeit unquantified, of a dry spring and summer in northern Illinois and perhaps other regions of the state. These indicators are:

Evolution of similar drought conditions in the past. Persistent and strengthening drought conditions from the northeastward Mexican border to Missouri. Cooler than normal sea-surface temperatures in the equatorial eastern Pacific Ocean (La Niña). The federal Climate Prediction Center forecast of continuation of weak La Niña. Persistent warmer than normal sea-surface temperatures in the north Atlantic Ocean.

Compounding the dry outlook is a tendency for above normal summer temperatures in Illinois after La Niña occurs in spring. "We are not aware of any indicators that point to any increased probability of wet conditions," said Winstanley.

JOHANNS ANNOUNCES NITROGEN FERTILIZER TOOL AS PART OF ENERGY STRATEGY

Agriculture could save up to \$1.5 billion annually by improving nitrogen applications

Agriculture Secretary Mike Johanns has announced the release of USDA's Energy Estimator for Nitrogen, a web-based awareness tool that farmers and ranchers can use to identify potential nitrogen cost savings associated with major crops and commercial nitrogen fertilizer applications.

"The Energy Estimator for nitrogen provides our nation's producers with another new tool to reduce their energy costs and protect the environment," said Johanns. "Encouraging proper fertilizer management is part of USDA's comprehensive energy strategy to help farmers and ranchers mitigate the impact of high energy costs."

Nitrogen fertilizer is one of the largest indirect uses of energy on an agricultural operation. Fertilizer accounts for 29 percent of agriculture's energy use, according to USDA research data. Proper management of nitrogen fertilizer, including the use of organic sources of nitrogen such as animal manure and cover crops, can save producers energy and money.


Using manure instead of petroleum-based fertilizers could reduce costs up to \$55 per acre, based on February 2006 prices, while adopting management intensive grazing practices can save up to \$6.50 per acre in energy costs and another \$38.00 in reduced harvest costs. In addition, converting from conventional tillage to no-till can save up to 3.5 gallons of fuel per acre with a current value of \$6.83 per acre. Nationwide, reducing application overlap on 250 million acres of cropland could save up to \$750 million in fertilizer and pesticide costs each year and doubling the use of manure-based nitrogen fertilizer to replace fertilizer produced from natural gas could save an additional \$750 million and 100 billion cubic feet of natural gas annually.

The Energy Estimator for Nitrogen estimates savings antirogen fertilizer applications and use to help farmers and ranchers make practical and sound decisions regarding nitrogen fertilizer use on their farm or ranch. This is the second tool USDA has developed as part of its overall energy strategy to mitigate the impacts of high energy costs and develop long-term solutions for agricultural producers. Last December, USDA released its first web-based tool - the "Energy Estimator for Tillage" - to help farmers and ranchers calculate diesel fuel use and costs associated with various tillage practices.

Producers using the Energy Estimator for Nitrogen can select up to four crops from a list of commonly harvested crops in their state. Next, they enter the acres of each crop, pounds or units per acre used for each selected form of nitrogen fertilizer, and the nitrogen fertilizer price. Finally, producers select the nitrogen fertilizer application practices - the timing and placement of the fertilizer application and whether or not they used materials that reduce potential nutrient losses to the environment.

USDA intends for farmers and ranchers to use the Energy Estimator for Nitrogen for guidance rather than as a sole source for decision-making on nitrogen fertilizer application. The Energy Estimator for Nitrogen identifies a producer's local USDA Service Center and provides links to state university soil and nitrogen information. USDA recommends that farmers and ranchers take their nitrogen fertilizer estimates to their local USDA Service Center, Extension office, or their crop consultant. DO CELLULAR PHONES CAUSE MORE VEHICLE ACCIDENTS?

It's common knowledge that the number one cause of work-related fatalities is vehicle accidents. Most companies have at least one truck, if not a whole fleet of vehicles, and their drivers face the hazards of the roadway day after day. Sometimes a trip ends tragically.

Now, a new technology threatens to increase the accident potential for drivers. In more and more companies, cellular phones are being used by construction, service and delivery personnel, as well as by management levels. According to one research study, the use of a cellular phone while driving increases the risk of having an accident four-fold. Another study found that having a cellular phone in a vehicle increased the risk of being involved in an accident by 34 %. The U.S. Department of Transportation reports an increase in the number of complaints about drivers talking on th phones while operating a vehicle. Critics of these studies argue that the research is poor and does not make a decisive connection. Besides, having a cellular telephone in the car can be an advantage when used to call emergency services. What do you think?

Reported Hazards Associated With Cellular Phones:

- Users are said to be distracted from defensive driving practices, and less responsive to highway traffic situations. When they do react, their response time is said to be longer.
- People on the phone are more likely to have intense conversations that involve problem-solving-which is more distracting than shooting the breeze with a passenger.
- Passengers in the car often alert drivers to dangerous situation, and stop talking at such times, in contrast to someone on the other end of the line who is unaware of the traffic situation.
- Cell phone users may be concentrating on dialing a number or handling the equipment and fail to notice a stop light, traffic sign, or a vehicle in front of them.
- Not only the driver on the phone, but other drivers on the roadway are at increased risk if a cell phone user is the ultimate cause of an accident.

Safety Reminders For Cell Phone Users:

- Keep conversations short and sweet. Develop ways to get free of long-winded friends and associates while or the road. Don't use the cell phone for social visiting.
- Hang up in tricky traffic situations-without warning if necessary. Safe driving takes precedence over telephone etiquette. You can explain later-- because you'll still be alive!
- Resist dialing a number while on the move in heavy traffic whenever possible; wait until you are at a traffic light
- Keep even more distance between you and the car ahead of you than normally recommended.
- Consider using a "hands-free" speakerphone system, so you can keep your hands on the wheel and your eyes on the road-- and still keep talking. These speakerphones are available for many popular telephone models. Some states have proposed legislation that requires use of these devices.

All drivers are at risk of having a vehicle accident before, during or after work, and the use of a cell phone may increase this risk. Concentrate on the above reminders! Don't become a statistic

GOV. BLAGOJEVICH ENCOURAGES AGRICULTURAL INNOVATION WITH AWARD OF \$230,000 IN SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE GRANTS

Governor Rod R. Blagojevich today awarded \$230,000 in grants to promote the development of innovative farming practices that are profitable and conserve natural resources. The grants, which are part of the Governor's Opportunity Returns economic development strategy, will be distributed through the Illinois Department of Agriculture's Sustainable Agriculture Grant Program.

"Illinois farmers are good environmental stewards. The care they take to protect their land and water has made them among the most productive and efficient producers in the world," Gov. Blagojevich said. "These grants will help ensure our agriculture industry practices the most modern production and conservation techniques and our natural resources are preserved for future generations of farmers."

The grants will fund eight on-the-farm or university research projects and five educational outreach programs. Topics to be studied include the effect of drainage water management on nitrogen and phosphorous movement, land application systems for swine manure, the use of winter cover crops in organic farming and vermicomposting, a method of recycling food and yard waste using worms.

"Market conditions are causing many farmers to reevaluate their operations, and the research funded through this program can help them make informed decisions," Agriculture Director Chuck Hartke said. "The quality and diversity of the projects selected this year is quite impressive."

The Sustainable Agriculture Grant Program was established in 1996 as part of the Conservation 2000 program to research and implement methods of production that protect natural resources without sacrificing farm profitability.

Gov. Blagojevich's Opportunity Returns regional conomic development strategy is the most aggressive, imprehensive approach to creating jobs in Illinois' history. ace a one-size-fits-all approach to economic development ust doesn't work, the Governor has divided the state into 10 regions - each with a regional team that is empowered and expected to rapidly respond to opportunities and challenges. 



USDA UNVEILS NEW TOLL-FREE NUMBER FOR FSA BORROWERS FARMERS AND RANCHERS CAN CHECK ACCOUNT STATUS 24/7

Farm Service Agency Administrator Teresa Lasseter today announced that direct loan borrowers with USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) can now check the status of their accounts around the clock using a new toll-free telephone number.

"This convenient new tool gives customers up-to-theminute access to their accounts, helping producers better manage the daily operations of their farm or ranch," said Lasseter. "This secure system is fast, efficient and very user-friendly, and yet another hallmark of our commitment to provide high quality and convenient services."

The toll-free number is 1-888-518-4983 and is available in both English and Spanish. The system delivers information on active FSA loans 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

The telephone system provides FSA direct loan borrowers with the following information:

- loan number;
- original loan amount;
- unpaid principal;
- * if the borrower is delinquent and the amount of the delinquency;
- * due date of next installment;
- * principal and interest amount of next installment;
- date last payment was received;
- * amount of interest paid in current calendar year; and
- amount of interest paid for prior loan year.

During the first call to the new system, borrowers will enter their tax identification number (TIN) or the social security number (SSN) associated with the loan. They also will need to enter their zip code. Borrowers will create a personal identification number (PIN) for security. Customers must enter their PIN every time they use the system and may change their PIN. The system menu helps users access helpful information. The system may also direct borrowers to contact their local FSA servicing office if action is necessary on their accounts.

FSA has more than 73,000 direct borrowers with about \$7.2 billion in its loan portfolio. The agency makes direct farm ownership, operating and emergency loans to family-size farmers and ranchers who cannot obtain commercial credit from a bank, Farm Credit System institution or other lenders. Borrowers can use FSA loans to purchase land, livestock, equipment, feed, seed, and supplies, construct buildings or make farm improvements. Special loan programs also exist for rural youth.

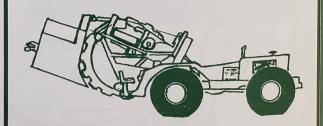
