CAPITOL NEWS

Governor Rod R. Blagojevich announced in November 2006 that he has nominated seven projects in Illinois for U.S. EPA Targeted Watersheds Grant Program. Projects nominated by the Governor will help improve waterways quality across the state, from the South Branch of the Chicago River, to the Kincaid-Reeds Creek in Jackson County, to the Mackinaw River Watershed. The U.S. EPA is expected to announce the final grant recipients in the Spring of 2007.

"One of the best things we can do for future generations is to help make sure the water flowing through our rivers and lakes is clean and safe. I've worked hard in Illinois to improve the quality of our waterways - from reducing mercury emissions to funding restoration projects in our lakes and streams. But we can't do it alone - we need partners at the local level who are also committed to protecting their water sources and making them last for years to come. The seven projects we're nominating for federal funding are all doing just that," said Governor Blagojevich.

The Targeted Watersheds Grant Program is designed to further protect and restore the country's waterways through



community-based approaches and activities specifically to help local water resources. For 2006, U.S. EPA will award up to \$16 million to as many as 20 of the nation's outstanding watershed practitioners, to help fund various projects like wetland restoration, and infrastructure development and expansion projects.

2006 CONSERVATION EXPO

Progress City USA, Decatur Illinois—Permanent Home of the Illinois Farm Progress Show



The Illinois Land Improvement Contractors of America (ILICA) in conjunction with Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA), United States Department of Agriculture - Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Macon County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD), University of Illinois (U of I) Extension, United States Department of Agriculture Farm Services Agency (FSA), City of Decatur, Richland Community College, Progress City USA, Archer Daniels-Midland (ADM), and Trees Forever agreed to hold the 2006 Conservation Expo on 40 acres of property adjacent to Progress City USA and Richland Community College campus in Decatur, Illinois. This Conservation Expo was designed to implement and showcase

the most current best management practices in drainage and erosion control to land improvement contractors and landowners, and facilitate the means for U of I professors to test a water treatment practice called a bioreactor, which uses buried wood chips to naturally break down nitrates in farm field drainage water before it reaches a surface water body. The show dates were August 29 - 31, 2006 and the practices included the implementation of conventional and satellite-linked water control structures, grassed waterways, block chute construction, sub-surface drainage, armor-loc and armor-flex erosion control installation, gabion mattress installation, waterway diversions and hydro-seeding technique. Many of our Associate members generously donated material or the use of equipment to support this event to help make it a success. Two trench-type bioreactors, as well a 20' x 20' experimental pit design bioreactor were installed under the direction of University of Illinois professor, Dr. Richard Cooke. Dr. Cooke will monitor the water quality through a series of access tubes in each bioreactor.




The 2006 Expo was held on 40 acres of property adjacent to Progress City USA and Richland Community College campus in Decatur, Illinois. Approximately 20 acres of this area is frequently used for parking during the Farm Progress Show and other events at Progress City USA as well as being farmed for hay. The remaining acreage is allocated for handling the runoff water shed from parking at Richland Community College and the surrounding farm ground. The original

land improvement done for the Farm Progress Show at Progress City USA had provided minimal erosion control. This created the opportunity for the Conservation Expo to improve the quality of water leaving the show site and entering Lake Decatur, just a few miles away. The Progress City

USA site had the additional resources of electric hookups, restroom facilities and a large building that was used for meals and show headquarters, which made the Expo possible, even with the wet weather conditions that were encountered all 3 days. 





TOOL BOX TALKS... FROM CNA

PRE-EXCAVATION CHECK LIST DO NOT DIG WITHOUT LOCATE MARKS

Complete and sign this sheet prior to excavation taking place.



BEFORE YOU LEAVE THE SHOP OBTAIN LOCATE NUMBERS AND;

- Check to see if locates have been completed (look at due date).
- Make sure you have a field sketch or if one was left at the job site.

If you do not have what is listed above, do not leave the shop. See your supervisor.

ON THE JOB SITE

PRE-SURVEY (CHECKING FOR LOCATES)

- Check for field sketch.
- Check for all facility marks on ground.
 - Verify all service feeds from buildings and/or homes and that they have been located and/or that they are
 - Draw a sketch of the marked facilities for future use.
 - Check for any visible signs of pedestal, riser, new trench lines that may have been missed in your dig area.
 - Check to make sure that dig area is defined and is the same on locate sketch when possible.
 - Check for any private facilities not located. If they are not located, locate them or contact someone to get them located for you.
 - If there are high priority facilities in your dig area, make sure facility owner/locator is on the job site and/or has been contacted for advice.

If lines are not located completely, consult locate card and contact responsible party.

PUBLIC AND PRIVATE UTILITIES

- Ask for assistance from homeowner, utilize locating equipment and use common sense.
- Locate septic lines.
- Locate water yard lines
- Locate private power lines to sheds, wells, invisible fences, etc.
- Locate private gas or propane lines.
- Locate sprinkler lines, heads and drip systems
- Draw a sketch of locations for all private facilities on the job site.
- Locate telecommunication cables (TV, Telephone, Fiber Optics, etc.)

EXCAVATING

- If paralleling or working on a critical or high priority line, pot hole or use locating equipment to expose and verify location and depth of facility every 100 ft.
- Hand dig within 24 inches (or as required in your state) of lines, peds, pole risers, meters or other structures.
- Bore away from facilities.
- Verify depth of any facilities boring across, change route or depth as required, notify supervisor
- Do not place excavated dirt on locate marks, flags, whiskers, etc.

BACKFILLING

- Shade all lines placed or exposed with good fill dirt
- Verify all fill dirt is free from rocks, cable trash, crew trash and large dirt clods

PLEASE DIG SAFELY

As an excavator, you are responsible for verifying that all facilities within the dig area have been located. You are responsible for locating all private and public facilities. Have the homeowner assist you if necessary.




